Charles was born on 19 November 1600 at Dunfermline Palace, twelve miles outside Edinburgh, in a bedroom overshadowed by the great stone tower of Dunfermline Abbey. When his father became King of England he was still there; and when his mother, his brother and elder sister Elizabeth all moved south across the border, never to return, Charles stayed behind, in the care of nurses, servants and guards, at Dunfermline.
